

The TRUMENBA (Meningococcal Group B Vaccine) Discussion Guide

Are you sure your child is protected?

Start the conversation about meningococcal group B disease (MenB) with these questions

Talking with your child's healthcare provider about MenB is the best way to understand the risks and to decide whether vaccination with TRUMENBA is right for your child. To ensure you have a thorough and informative conversation, print out this sheet and answer the questions below. Keep them in mind when you talk with your child's healthcare provider.

Questions to discuss with your child's healthcare provider

- If my child already received a vaccination for meningococcal disease, does he or she need TRUMENBA, too?
- What are the possible side effects of TRUMENBA?
- How many doses does TRUMENBA require?
- Can TRUMENBA be given with other vaccines?
- What is the best age to vaccinate my child with TRUMENBA?
- My child is getting ready to go to camp or college. Should he or she be vaccinated with TRUMENBA?

INDICATION

- Trumenba is a vaccine indicated for individuals 10 through 25 years of age for active immunization to prevent invasive disease caused by *Neisseria meningitidis* group B
- Trumenba is approved based upon demonstrated immune response against four group B strains representative of prevalent strains in the US. The effectiveness of Trumenba against diverse group B strains has not been confirmed
- Individuals with weakened immune systems may have a reduced immune response
- The most common adverse reactions were pain at the injection site, fatigue, headache, muscle pain, and chills
- Data are not available on the safety and effectiveness of using Trumenba and other meningococcal group B vaccines interchangeably to complete the vaccination series
- Tell your healthcare provider if you are pregnant, or plan to become pregnant
- Ask your healthcare provider about the risks and benefits of Trumenba. Only a healthcare provider can decide if Trumenba is right for you or your child

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

- Trumenba should not be given to anyone with a history of a severe allergic reaction after a previous dose of Trumenba
